HORSES RESCUED DURING FLOOD

Cowgirls and cowboys save the day with the Santa Clara County Horsemen's Association

The Santa Clara County Horsemen's Association reports that 28 stranded horses have been successfully rescued from the February 2017 San Jose Coyote Creek flood.

The horses were transferred for safety to Hope Ranch in Almaden and the South Bay Horse Ranch in Gilroy. The public became aware of the plight of the stranded horses when a KNTV helicopter streamed aerial photos and video on Tuesday, Feb. 21.

The first horse rescued was Brownie which was safely reunited with its owner after crews helped the animal cross a river. Horse owners said the rescues that happened gradually were necessary and riding across the river is the best thing for

ONE OF ONLY 11 STUDENTS IN THE WORLD Cao earns 'Perfect' score on Advanced Placement Exam for second time

Evergreen Valley High School student Anton Cao for earned perfect scores on his Advanced Placement (AP) Calculus BC Exam for the second time.

This was the second time Cao earned a perfect score on an AP exam. His first perfect score came last year when he was an 11th grader and earned a perfect score on the AP Calculus AB Exam in Spring 2015.

Cao was 1 of only 11 students in the world to earn every point possible on the AP Calculus BC

Exam. Looking across approximately 4.7 million AP Exams taken by 2.6 million U.S. public high school students in 2016, close to 400 students earned every point possible on an AP exam, a rare accomplishment.

"Anton not only possesses an exceptional aptitude and love for math, but he also demonstrates impressive diligence and persistence, which places him into a rare species of students," said Garry Redillas, Cao's AP Calculus BC math teacher. "His congenial

The recent flooding in San Jose struck many in our community and the clean-up continues.

We keep hearing so many great stories relating to the community stepping up to offer aid; helping the many families impacted as well as assisting with clean-up efforts at the many parks that were flooded, including the Happy Hollow Park and Zoo.
