Founded in 1999 by the Youth Alliance, today Project Cornerstone is a non-profit organization and community initiative of the YMCA of Silicon Valley. Our mission is to ensure all youth feel valued, respected, and known so they grow into healthy, caring, and responsible adults.

We engage youth, parents/caring adults, and staff from schools and community organizations to strengthen healthy social and emotional skills and behaviors, build positive relationships, and create safe and supportive environments. Utilizing Search Institute's Developmental Assets and Developmental Relationships frameworks, and the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning's (CASEL's) Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) model, our programs and services support the development of life skills youth need to thrive and provide effective tools and strategies for adults to build strong families, schools, and communities.

Our partnerships with hundreds of Silicon Valley schools have resulted in the creation of caring school climates and empowered tens of thousands of youth to stand up against bullying while fostering empathy, inclusion, and a sense of purpose and belonging.

Since the first celebration in 2003, the YMCA Project Cornerstone Asset Champions event has recognized Silicon Valley schools, individuals, and organizations that are committed to making this a better place for young people to live and grow. We honor adult role models, PreK-high schools that are creating caring and bullying-free school environments, youth whose actions and behaviors make them positive role models for their peers, and organizations/people who provide opportunities for young people to make meaningful contributions to their community and/or help them feel supported and proud of their identity. The goal of the Asset Champions event is to honor and share the stories of these people, organizations, and schools in a community-building and celebratory setting.

## About the Speakers and Performers

### **El Grito de la Cultura**

Folklorico Nacional Mexicano de Elena Robles and the academy El Grito de la Cultura were founded in 1987 to empower youth and develop their talents through dance and cultural activities. Students participate in community service, gaining confidence and learning that they have much to contribute to their community.

### **Bella Villasis, CMT San Jose**

Bella is a sophomore at Evergreen High School. She has been featured in many productions at Children's Musical Theater (CMT) and is currently playing the role of Philoclea in CMT's Mainstage premiere of the Broadway hit, *Head Over Heels*.

### **Dr. Victor Rios, Keynote Speaker**

Dr. Victor Rios is MacArthur Foundation Chair and Professor of Sociology at the University of California, Santa Barbara. Professor Rios has worked with local school districts to develop programs for students who have been left behind in their education. Using his personal experience of living on the streets, dropping out of school, and being incarcerated as a juvenile—along with his research findings—he has developed interventions for marginalized students aimed at promoting personal transformation and civic engagement. He is the author of six books and has had the honor of meeting President Obama and advising his administration on gun violence and policing. His Ted Talk "Help for kids the education system ignores" has garnered over 1.6 Million views and he is the subject of the documentary film *The Pushouts* ([thepushouts.com](http://thepushouts.com)). She currently co-leads the newly created Division of Equity and Social Justice for the County of Santa Clara. Maribel is also a community artist, whose works have been recognized by local arts nonprofits including the MACLA, School of Arts and Culture, Teatro Vision, and The California Arts Council. She sees her work, whether in the office or out in the community or in the arts, as equity; what healing looks like in public.

### **Saisujan Kotakonda, Youth Emcee**

A junior at Fremont High School, Sai is an active member of several clubs and initiatives including Science Olympiad and Fremont High's leadership class. He is passionate about advocating for mental health and wellness among students, as well as aerospace engineering. ## Project Cornerstone 2023 Asset Champions

### **Caring High School Climate South County Community School (Santa Clara County Office of Education)**

South County Community School is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) and is committed to providing an educational environment that promotes the development of literacy, 21st-century skills, resiliency, and appropriate social skills that will help our students to have a successful life. Our Course of Studies in the core subject areas address the California Academic Content Standards, and students actively earn credits toward graduation.



Our educational programs serve students who are undergoing expulsion, deficient in credits, and/or have experienced challenges in matriculation in traditional school settings and need a smaller, more supportive school environment. Our goal is to treat the needs of the whole youth, ensuring that they grow in our program with enhanced academic and social skill sets, a belief in their ability to succeed, and the knowledge that they have a team to support them.

Annameekee Hesik is an English Teacher, coach, and a champion for youth at Los Gatos High School (LGHS). A celebrated role model, Annameekee is a constant presence on campus, including being an advisor for the school’s Gay Straight Alliance (GSA) and a panel moderator for LGHS’ “Celebrate Diversity Week.”

Annameekee aims to make her classroom a welcoming and safe environment for all learners. When searching for books to bring into her classroom library, she looked for those that would be representative of her LGBTQ students and show them how to appreciate and be proud of their cultural and personal identities. When she couldn’t find the specific books she wanted, she wrote them herself by creating “The You Know Who Girls” series, which has a diverse cast and focuses on one high schooler’s journey of coming out and finding her joy along the way. An accomplished author, Annameekee has also been featured on several film and radio mediums.

She is a strong advocate for children, she is adored and looked up to by her students, and she is inclusive ensuring that no student is underrepresented or left out. ## **Caring Preschool-Elementary School Climate Aptitud Community Academy at Goss (Alum Rock School District)**

Aptitud Community Academy at Goss is a TK – 8 school in the Alum Rock Union School District. We thrive to be a welcoming, safe community where all students can thrive. Staff members share the vision that students do best when there is a foundation of care and relationships to strengthen student achievement.



It is the goal of the team to ensure that each and every student is connected to an adult on campus they can trust and talk to. In partnership with SCCOE, we house a wellness center run by two full-time staff members. In addition to our school counselor, they make up the wellness team and serve students and teachers by bringing lessons and activities into the classrooms.

Aptitud serves students' social emotional health with various interventions and supports. In each classroom, teachers have created "Peace Corners" where students will find a variety of tools to support calming, emotional health and refocusing. All students receive monthly character lessons to strengthen and develop as well-rounded students. When students need more support they can use the Wellness Center, a flexible, calm space on campus where students visit to self-regulate, take a calming break or access a counselor. The staff at Aptitud genuinely believes that all students can succeed in a safe, welcoming environment with strong relationships.

"We have been a part of the Aptitud community for 2 years and have found that the administration has made it a priority to create a safe haven for all students. As a parent, I know that every day when my children are there, they receive the education and support every child deserves. Silicon Valley Youth Climate Action (SVYCA) is a youth-led 501(c)(3) nonprofit that empowers teens and young adults to combat climate change through impactful education and policy initiatives. SVYCA has led youth leadership development workshops, spearheaded community outreach initiatives, shared educational materials across schools, and successfully advocated for ambitious climate-friendly policies at the local, regional, and state level.



With action teams in Cupertino, Sunnyvale, San José, Morgan Hill, and Santa Clara, SVYCA has become uniquely poised to advance climate policies and outreach in these communities. Local efforts include organizing climate-focused city council candidate forums, engaging in public outreach at schools and community events, and successfully advocating for ambitious sustainability policies such as passing strong Climate Action Plans, Waste Reduction, and Building Electrification. SVYCA youth are committed to scaling up climate solutions with teams dedicated to state-level policies, regional initiatives within the counties of Santa Clara and San Mateo, environmental education across local school districts, and transportation issues across the Bay Area.
